

Greetings Bethel!


Each time as I have faced transition in my time in ministry I have reflected on the story of the Road to Emmaus that is found in the twenty fourth chapter of the Gospel of Luke. It is my favorite story in all of the Bible. It is the passage that Bishop Jessica Crist preached on on my ordination day, and it is the passage that was read the day I hopped on an airplane to Malaysia to spend a year as a Young Adult in Global Mission with the ELCA. In this passage two of Jesus' followers are walking down the road. They have recently been devastated by his death on the cross, and they are discussing this grief when a stranger joins them on the road. I have loved to call this stranger "sneaky Jesus" over the


years. As sneaky Jesus joins them they don't realize who he is, but he asks what they are talking about, and they are offended that he doesn't already know! But nonetheless they tell him the story of Jesus, and he comes right back by calling them foolish and explaining the Scriptures and God's promises to them. They still don't understand who he is, but when they get to their home they invite him in for the evening. It is only as he breaks bread with them that they recognize him and are amazed at his presence. Their famous quote at this point is "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?".

As I reflect on the passage I view us as congregations and people of faith as the folks walking along the road together. We walk through hard days, celebratory days, mundane days, and everything in between together. As we do that though, undoubtedly, God shows up! Sneaky Jesus walks into our lives and reveals God's glory and some days we can't even believe it! As I prepare to leave you all in the coming week or so. I want to give thanks for the many instances that we have been walking together on this road of life and sneaky Jesus has joined us in incredible ways. I will never forget my first family worship, sitting in awe as our young ones led us bravely through Scripture and prayer. I will always remember the year where it seemed we had two funerals each month, and somehow you lifted one another up and continued to build up hope. I remember fondly the first time Tesher and Anna said yes to reading prayers and overcame their fears beautifully to proclaim the Word of God. I will always have a smile on my face when I remember baptizing little Myla Frieling, who slept peacefully through the entire ceremony until she was introduced to the congregation when she woke up wide eyed to great us all. Finally, I will always be thankful for the conversations had over Bible Studies and Confirmation Classes that sometimes followed a straight through line, and other times found tangents that none of us could quite trace back, but graced us with revelation and understand regardless.

Jesus has shown up in some incredible ways in the past few years my friends, and I give thanks that our hearts got to burn together as we greeted him along the road. I hope that you continue to keep your eyes open for Jesus amongst you. Love one another deeply. Care for each other on the hard days, and celebrate with one another on the good ones. I know that big things will continue to happen in this place and through you all, so keep pointing to Christ and learning from his love, just as you have all along.

GOSPEL MESSAGE

Hope against Hope

Paul tells us that Abraham hoped "against hope" (Romans 4:18). Many of us know this feeling. The injustices in our world, the damage we see in the environment, and the wounds we bear in our own souls can all seem like too much. The promises of redemption poured out in baptism sometimes seem so far away.



Amid this reality, we hear Jesus teach that he "must" suffer, die, and rise again. To Peter this sounded like foolishness. If the Messiah were rejected, how could the salvation they longed for ever come? But Jesus insists that to deny this is to reject "the things of God." Why must it be so?

Because of God's great love. Jesus must suffer because he will do everything that needs to be done to rescue God's world from sin and death. He will endure rejection, torture, and even death. He "must" do this because the world's brokenness is that deep. We don't need better teaching or stronger motivation. We need rescue from powers greater than ourselves. He will bear the burden of sin and death in his body to release us from their grasp. Love drives him to this full extent of mercy.

And in the mystery of God's grace, Jesus will die. But he will be raised again. And his death and resurrection set us free from sin and death's power. We can hope, even in the most hopeless of circumstances, because Jesus has passed through all the evils that threaten us and emerged triumphant. In Jesus, our sins are forgiven, the world's injustices will not last forever, and everything broken will be made gloriously new. Until then, he gathers us around the life-giving word and gives himself to us in a holy meal. He leads us on our cross-shaped journeys of dying to sin to discover true life. And he sends us forth to share the good news of God's mercy with a world longing for hope.

Abraham and Sarah trusted God and believed that God would keep the promise to give them lots of children and grandchildren, even though they were nearly 100 years old.


Jesus trusted and believed that God would always be with him, even when he knew he was going to die on the cross.








Welcome to worship. Today is the second Sunday in Lent.
