We are about to turn the page on the Church year calendar. Beginning next Wednesday, Ash Wednesday, the church will observe its forty day journey to Easter (not counting Sundays) called *Lent*. During this forty day period the church begins an annual examination of its spiritual condition. The ancient church observed the faith practices of fasting, penitence and alms giving~ practices that point us to Jesus' forty days of fasting in the desert. Fasting during Lent can mean the discipline of abstaining from certain foods or habits which distance us from God. Penitence is expressing our sorrow for sin through repentance so that God will raise us up to live in a right relationship with God and with others. Receiving the ashes on Ash Wednesday is a sign of repentance and sorrow for sin. It helps us to remember our mortality and the limits placed on human life. As the writer of Genesis says, "From dust you have come, and to dust you shall return." The practice of alms giving is giving money or food to the poor. During our mid-week worship, we have received an offering for the Pastor's Discretionary Fund ~ to provide for those in need. All these faith practices are intended to help one deepen their relationship with God. By observing these practices the followers of Jesus can nurture a faithful and rich way of living

It is interesting that this year Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day are observed on the same day. In the fourth century, the Roman Catholic Church established the Feast Day of Saint Valentine. There are a number of legends told of who Saint Valentine actually was. One legend tells of a man named Valentine who was a prisoner and fell in love with his jailor's daughter. Just before he died, he penned a note to his true love and signed it, "From your Valentine." In our time, the celebration of Valentine's Day is far different from that of a Saint's Feast Day. On Ash Wednesday, we will be invited to consider the state of our hearts before God and to turn towards God who is the source of love and life. On Valentine's Day we remember those we love and have affection for. Just maybe a connection can be made between the two observances. Life's short, make every moment count for good with those whom we love. Remember and turn towards the One who is the origin of your life and love.

Ash Wednesday Worship will be held on Wednesday, February 14<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm. We will receive the imposition of ashes and holy communion.

# Mission Freedom Campaign Update

First of all, many thanks to those of you who have supported our efforts to service and retire our debt from our remodeling project! The generosity you have provided is a testament to your faith and commitment to our shared goal of freeing up our financial obligations as soon as possible, to achieve Mission Freedom and redirect efforts to our Missionary priorities.

We launched our second capital campaign (Mission Freedom) last spring and we would like to share the results this far. The campaign has had 32 pledges representing gifts of \$292,970. Our campaign goal was to achieve over 50 pledges totaling \$500,000 – that goal was designed to enable us to retire the mortgage by 2022. The good news: these campaign results have secured the funding needed to service the mortgage over the next 5 years. The bad news: our current level of pledges is short of our goal, which would require us to have a 3<sup>rd</sup> capital campaign in the spring of 2021.

A third capital campaign has three detrimental effects. One, we estimate that taking five additional years to retire the mortgage will cost the congregation roughly \$40,000 in avoidable interest expense. Two, we will need to put considerable time and effort into organizing and conducting another campaign. Three, most importantly, we lose the opportunity to redirect our financial capabilities to the ministries that Bethel is passionate about.

However, we believe many members will continue to contribute to the Mission Freedom effort through “non-pledged” contributions. As a matter of fact, our first capital campaign had 42 members who contributed to the campaign without a formal pledge. ***“Non-pledged” support is critical to achieve our goal of Mission Freedom.*** We know and understand a pledge is a big commitment, which is difficult for many to make – this is why non-pledged contributions are just as valuable as pledged

contributions. ***If you are unable to submit a pledge, please prayerfully consider making non-pledged contributions – this could potentially eliminate the need for a third capital campaign!***

We also want to stress that any gifts to Mission Freedom should be above and beyond your commitment to the General Fund. There is no deadline to submit a pledge or contribute to the Mission Freedom effort, and as noted above, both pledged and non-pledged gifts are very important.

There is a lot of detail below, as we felt it was important to be as transparent as possible. Please reach out to Mike Kubas and/or Earl Terwilliger if you would like clarification on any items, or have any questions – we would be more than happy to assist.

## Key Points:

- We have a \$2,600 monthly mortgage payment.
- We expect about \$1,300 of pledged dollars that come in each month, creating a \$1,300 shortfall vs. the mortgage payment from a timing perspective.
- We expect the following lump sum payments in the fourth quarter of each respective year, which are in addition to the monthly gifts noted above:
  - \$38,000 in 2018
  - \$31,000 in 2019
  - \$31,000 in 2020
  - \$30,000 in 2021
  - \$20,000 in 2022
- This does not include non-pledged gifts which in the past was several hundred dollars per month.
- We also have been getting non-pledged year-end gifts that were not included in our forecast.
