

#### David (Dave) Mikulecky

September 23, 1941 – September 21, 2018

David Stanley Mikulecky went to be with his Heavenly Father on Friday September 21, 2018, after living a life serving others.

Dave was born on September 23, 1941, in Lone Pine, CA and lived at the Cerro Gordo silver mine before moving to Stockton, CA. When he was four, his family moved back to Detroit Lakes, MN where he graduated from high school. In 1967, he graduated from Moorhead State College summa cum

laude with a Bachelor's Degree in Secondary Education. Later he obtained Master Degrees in Industrial Technology and Vocational Education.

He married Marilys "Mim" Morberg in 1963. Their daughter Andrea was born in 1967, at which time they moved to Great Falls, MT where David began a 34 year teaching career with the Great Falls Public Schools. Their son Stephen arrived in 1970, completing their family.

Dave had a strong faith in his Lord and was passionate about working with youth and giving back to the community. He was an active member of his church and served on various boards, teaching confirmation, even becoming a Lay Pastoral Associate in his retirement years.

He was a lifelong Boy Scout becoming an Eagle Scout in 1956. As an adult he served as Scoutmaster until his son became an Eagle Scout in 1988. He then became active at the District level serving on numerous committees and receiving many honors and awards. In 1993, he received the rare Silver Beaver award which is given to adult scouters with exceptional character who have provided distinguished service to young people. He also received the Lamb Award which is a national recognition bestowed on Lutheran adults who have fostered the spiritual growth of youth through church and civic youth serving agency programs and have increased the use and quality of the civic agency programs in Lutheran congregations as a part of their ministries with youth.

One of his greatest joys was seeing all three of his grandsons involved in scouting with the oldest becoming a 3<sup>rd</sup> generation Eagle Scout in 2017.

Dave had a love for family, life and learning, putting his heart and soul into what was important to him. He loved the outdoors in every season and filled many hours of his life with camping, backpacking, fishing, hunting, cross-country skiing, canoeing, and hiking. Some of

his happiest times were spent with family and friends around a campfire. David also enjoyed photography, fly-tying and recording family history.

He was a great father and husband and will be missed by his family, his many friends and all those whose lives he touched.

He was preceded in death by his parents Stanley and Frances Mikulecky. He is survived by Mim, his wife of 55 years, daughter, Andrea Mikulecky of Great Falls, MT, son, Stephen (Melinda) Mikulecky of Everett, WA, grandsons Logan, Hayden and Tyson Mikulecky of Everett, WA, sisters Mary Lou (Tom) Kusserow of Salt Lake City, UT and Carol "Mickey" (Charlie) Lego of North Olmsted, OH.

## PASTOR STEVE'S MESSAGE

"Have salt in yourselves and be at peace with one another." Mark 9:50

You have heard it said, "We are our own worst enemies." In the context of the assigned readings for this Sunday, we are reminded that we have tendencies to trip over ourselves and to even cause others to trip up (intentionally and unintentionally) when it comes to living life to the fullest ~ as followers of the Way (Jesus).

When it comes to living the faith: we trip over ourselves and cause others to stumble in a number of different ways. It might be through blame, excuses, disbelief, pride and self-righteousness. All of which can and do divert us from living in God's grace through faith and service.

Following Jesus, 'on the way,' earns positive affirmation throughout the gospel of Mark. But we also learn from Jesus, in Sunday's gospel reading, that placing roadblocks or 'stumbling blocks' before ourselves or another 'on the way," (following Jesus) is problematic. Disciple John wants Jesus to know that there is an unknown exorcist who has been 'casting out demons, in Jesus' name, and that he and the other disciples had tried to stop him 'as he was not following them.' Jesus saw John's efforts as obstructionist ~ a stumbling block to the faith of others. He told John that all who, in Jesus' name, do Jesus' work in the world, are not against but for him. It appears that Jesus is telling his followers that God's purposes can and will be served in many and various ways. Be open to and welcome that. That is easier said than done as we wish things to be done the 'right way,' which is our way.

What is Jesus' way? It is to have salt in ourselves, and to be at peace with one another. We sing about having salt in ourselves in our liturgy this Sunday. "Build up, prepare the way. Remove the obstructions from my people's way. God is near, God is here today. God sees all our destruction. How we get in love's way. Still God comes and meets us with a steady, healing embrace. Build up......"

Salt and fire were used in first century medicine to heal wounds. Jesus uses the expression, "to have salt in ourselves," to mean "to be at peace," as well as to be God's flavor of love and grace in the world. This Sunday, we will have the opportunity to be at peace through the gifts and promises of Word and Sacrament and by receiving the anointing of oil and anointing for healing. We acknowledge our need for healing the wounds which we suffer as individuals, the church, the nation and the world. In the words of our liturgy, "In the name of Christ, the great healer and reconciler of the world, we entrust to God, ourselves and all who are in need of healing."
