

A Message from the Congregation

Noticing God in Everyday Life Shirley Cayko, LPA

I'M NEW

In today's world, who are the privileged and who are the poor?

Looking back over the years, there were times when my family was very poverty stricken, but rich in spirit. There was unconditional love, security, shelter, food, though at times not much, and knowing that there was always someone that had your back. Privileged or poor? There were times when the crops were plenty, the pantry full, Air Jordan basketball shoes on the feet, a warm house and comfortable bed to sleep in, but there were conditions for showing approval, failure was not an option, laughter not present, words were silent.

Privileged or Poor?

As we see in Luke's Gospel there is the theme of "rising and falling". This Jesus is the sign, says wise old Simeon, who will be spoken against. (Luke 2:34) The home town boy who has made it good, returns and is greeted with what was not perceived by the citizen's as a perfect meeting.

Jesus sees into the citizen's hearts and knows how they will react, to his rhetoric on physicians and the prophet's fates in their hometowns, before they knew how they would respond to him. Jesus knows his words of prophetic grace will meet with rejection -- even right here in his home town synagogue. "They got up, drove him out of town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they might hurl him off the cliff. But he passed through the midst of them and went on his way." Luke 4: 29-30

The good news of the gospel in Luke is tied to the person of Jesus, who is still both crucified and risen. "We are not promised any easier fate than is our Lord, who preached prophetic grace, dealt with rejection, and still managed to be on his way." 1 (David Scnassa,) The verbiage of this text has a ring that reminds us similarly of the resurrection mystery. Jesus "passed through the midst of them and went on his way" (Luke 4:30).

Can we pass through rejection and still be on our way? Privileged or poor?

We are all privileged and poor. Jesus's fate sealed us with the gift of grace from the cross. In his name, with the profound Grace of God, the spirit will lead us through rejection and set us on our way.

What a profound gift of grace Jesus has given us and what a better time to be present and go on our way than approaching the season of Lent.


2019 Gongregational Vitality Survey Results

Thank you to all who completed the Congregational Vitality Survey. We had an amazing response with 160 surveys turned in. For those who wish to see the <u>survey</u> in its entirety, and the accompanying <u>bar graphs</u>, please select on the hyperlinks in this document. The following is a summary of the results.



The vitality score comes from the average of 15 key items that, when combined, show the congregation's overall connections to God, each other and the world. Scores over 4 are considered vital. The sustainability score shows the average from the question about overall sustainability. Average scores over 3 (able to maintain ministry) are considered sustainable. Vital and sustainable means we are on track, we remain flexible and keep focused on the foundational issues. We address any disagreements with respect and keep God's call front and center. Bethel is a vital congregation with an average vitality score of 4.3 and an average sustainability score of 3.4.

The survey recognizes nine areas that impact a congregation's health and vitality but they are not all equally important. Think of this as building blocks. The foundation and lower domains influence the way higher domains are lived out. They have to be strong in order to support the blocks above. Linda Bobbitt has a diagram like the following in her report:



How does Bethel experience God's presence: 30%

Research suggests that transformation is possible when at least 20% of participants experience God as present and active.

This score represents the percentage of all respondents who gave the strongest rating possible for God's active presence in the congregation. Spiritual renewal is a critical first step in congregational renewal and vitality.

Sense of Mission at Bethel: 4.4

This field summarizes the congregation's sense of mission. Ideally this number will be near 4.5. People in Bethel should be very clear about God's call.

Relationships at Bethel: 92%

This field shows the percent of respondents who describe a healthy social climate (harmony or respectful disagreements). Ideally this number will be over 80%. When congregation's work toward vitality, it tends to rock the boat and some people struggle.

Bethel Leadership: 39%

Vital, sustainable congregations most often have leadership that inspires others to action. Ideally this number will be over 50%. What kind of leadership does Bethel perceive? How does Bethel more intentionally engage people in pursuing their spiritual passions?

Bottom line: Bethel is a Vital and Sustainable congregation. But is this good enough?

There is always room for improvement and that is what the Strategic Planning Task Force is going to focus on in the coming weeks.

Some noticeable things from the survey are that the majority of the respondents, 88/160, are age 55 and older. What will this church look like in the future with fewer young people participating in church? How can we prepare for that? How do we create and appeal to younger people?

The following areas are some indicated possible challenges Bethel is facing.

God Scale Score 4.6/5

Connecting with God:

Help adults grow in faith

-Congregations connection with God

Clear sense of mission/purpose

Always ready to try new things

Willing to change to live into mission/purpose

-Respondents connection with God

Pace of Spiritual Growth is: Slow - Moderate

Seek out and use gifts of all ages

World scale score 4.3/5

-Connecting with the World seemed to need the most work

Where do we go from here?

The Strategic Task Force would like to ask each ministry (i.e. Altar guild, Choir, Men's breakfast, Council, Close Knit, Bethel Bunch, Hope Circle, Logos, etc.) to take a few minutes as they gather to answer some questions.

These small group meetings will continue through March (3/10 and 3/24). We will be asking the same questions above and gathering input from the congregation.
