





Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return

On Ash Wednesday we will mark the beginning of Lent. Lent is the forty days (not counting Sundays) which leads us to Easter. During the Ash Wednesday liturgy we will receive the imposition of ashes on our brows (or on your wrist if you prefer) and hear these ancient and sobering words from the writer of Genesis,"...you are dust, and to dust you shall return." You will be marked with an ashen sign of the cross - the same sign given in baptism. And it is the sign which claims us and stays with us throughout our whole lives. Initially the season of Lent was set aside for those preparing for Baptism at Easter. As part of the final preparation, people left behind all of the things of this world that got in the way of their relationship with God. They spent time in fasting, prayer, serving the poor and other disciplines of the Christian life. They went through intensive instruction in what being a Christian was all about. They prepared for lives of loving service in the world.

The ashen sign of the cross given on Ash Wednesday is for us. It is meant to remind us of our own mortality. It is a visible and humbling reminder that we have fallen short of who God has created us to be. But this same ashen cross also reminds us where we find new life – in Christ's atoning work on the cross. As people marked by the cross, we



know that life is not easy nor pain-free. Trials and suffering are ours but also freedom and a peace that goes beyond our understanding. Come and enter into the journey of Lent.

Food that was donated was taken to the Hub for their pantry, frozen for our next host week and some perishable items were donated to TLC Daycare and they were very excited to receive them.





TRANSFORMATION

I think that **transformational moments happen** throughout our lives. Not all as miraculous as Moses' encounter with God on Mount Sinai, or Paul's Damascus Road experience, or Jesus and the disciples on Mount Transfiguration, but **they happen.**

- At your **baptism your call story began**. Salvation was given in Christ and as the Apostle Paul bears witness, "The old has passed away, behold the new has come."
- It might have been at **a life passage** moment (ie. marriage or at a funeral or graveside service for a friend or loved one.)
- It may have been at the birth or adoption of a child. Or even a pet you brought home and became part of your family.
- It might have been when a young one began their first day of school or left home for college.
- It was a moment when everything changed. A moment when everything was different and even if you weren't sure exactly how.

The scene in our gospel reading is a transformational moment like no other. It begins with Jesus inviting Peter, James and John along on an ascent of a mountain, to pray. The gospel writer, Luke, reveals to us that prayer and transformational moments walk hand in hand. Time spent with God transforms.

The power of prayer in God's presence transformed the disciples. They wanted to hold on and savor this experience for as long as possible. Jesus meant it as a moment that would foreshadow what was ahead for them. Jesus' departure. His suffering and death. Which would bring about the redemption and transformation of not only their lives but of the whole creation. They spent time on the mountain, but Jesus led them back down into the villages and neighborhoods. Into the lives of their friends and strangers.

Jesus prayed often and he taught us to pray, "Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread." This prayer is for the daily transformation of our lives. God will bring about the transformation and will open our eyes to see God's presence not just on the mountain tops but also in the day -to -day living. In our relationships with one another.

God Will Carry Us Through Every Death: Worshiping with Children on Ash Wednesday



Children know about death. More than we give them credit for. Many kids by the age of 5 or 7 have experienced at least the death of a beloved pet, or even a family member or friend. They know what it is like one day to be able to burrow their face in a cat's fur, hold their grandfather's hand, hear the voice of an auntie calling their name, smell the vanilla scent of Nana; then the next day, to feel the sudden wretched absence that comes with death. There is no longer any way to touch or smell or hear or see the physical body of the one who has died.

Children know about death, the aching hole it leaves behind; and if they do not know about it yet, they will soon enough. So it is important for us, as adults, to find ways to include our children in Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is a gift of the church to us all. The day's simple and stark ritual of ashes speaks honestly of death. We take dirt, ashes of palms, and press them onto each other's foreheads. We say the old words: Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return.

This act might be straight-up depressing, did we not mark the ashes in the shape of a cross. The same cross is marked on the foreheads of the newly baptized. The same cross is inscribed on every Christian forever. With Ash Wednesday's cross of ashes, we are saying that even in the face of death, our loving God is as close as our skin. Jesus is smudged on us, rubbed into our flesh, so that when we weep with all our hearts for those who have died, we are not alone. God is this close – a cross on our foreheads. So we can live in hope that a God so close will carry us through every death, even our own.

How does your congregation do at involving children in Ash Wednesday? Many children – not to mention their parents – will benefit from some preparation. Perhaps the children can help burn last year's palms into Ash Wednesday's ashes after worship on Transfiguration Sunday. On the day itself, maybe children can be invited forward before the Imposition of Ashes to see and touch the ashes for themselves? Can they be allowed to mark their own cross? Or cross another child? Afterwards, on the first Sunday in Lent, can Ash Wednesday's leftover ashes be brought out again and shown to those who forgot it even was Ash Wednesday, so they can see for themselves.
