

Words from the Bishop: Welcome

What does it mean to welcome? Many of us say "All are Welcome!" to our congregations or ministries. But what does that mean?

According to Ruth Fletcher, in her book *Thrive: Spiritual Habits of Transforming Congregations*, there is a difference between being "friendly" and being "welcoming." (pp. 75ff) *Friendliness* invites newcomers into what already exists and then expects them to change to fit into the current system. People in a friendly community say in subtle or not-so-subtle ways: "We're glad you joined our family. But it's OUR family and we hope you like the way we do things. If not, there's the door."

Welcoming, on the other hand, integrates newcomers into the community by letting them be themselves and allowing them to belong as equal partners with gifts, ideas, and experiences to share. Welcoming is willing to explore the new opportunities that newcomers can offer. In a welcoming community, members say with everything they say and do: "We want you to share your gifts and we're ready to be transformed by them."

Fletcher tells the story of a congregation whose members thought they were welcoming. {p.78} But as the newcomers began to take more responsibilities in fulfilling the mission of the congregation by trying new things and encouraging new ways of being community, the friendliness with which they were greeted when they arrived disappeared. Fletcher writes, "The established members complained that the



women who had more recently come...didn't comply with the rules of the church kitchen. Others grumbled about noisy, active children disrupting the Sunday service. When younger adults introduced a different kind of music, oldtimers put up with it for a while, but soon grew angry about all the changes in the church. The atmosphere in the congregation grew tenser until the newer people gave up and left. Then the old-timers breathed a sigh of relief and the church returned to its comfortable former habits..." To Fletcher's story, one might easily add the words "...and slowly died" because a congregation that does not find a way to be welcoming beyond friendliness will slowly dwindle away.

In an article entitled "All are Welcome" in the March 2016 edition of The Living Lutheran, Wendy Healy quotes Brenda Smith, "People are looking for three things in a church. One, a warm community that loves and follows Jesus; two, a place where they can learn something; and three, a church that is doing something to transform the world." To truly welcome people both newcomers and established members - is to construct a WHOLE community that creates opportunities for these three things to happen in a life-giving, spirit-empowering way that recognizes and welcomes everybody's gifts by "finding places where those gifts can best be used to serve the vision, mission, and values established by the whole congregation." (Fletcher, p. 83)

So how specifically can we go beyond friendliness to be truly welcoming in the Church? Here are three of many possible suggestions:

 Pay attention to the things you do or don't do that create barriers to the experience of welcome for people. For example, do you only engage with your own cliques or do you invite people beyond your friendship group into your church experiences?

- Cleanse your expectations about what newcomers can provide to the congregation; instead, focus on what you can provide to them. (Cf. Matthew 25: 35-40) If the congregation hopes that newcomers will become replacement parts for members who are worn out from carrying the load, it won't be a real welcome. Instead, the perceptible neediness and self-serving expectations will scare people away.
- Learn how to listen and live in ways that creates a space where each person's complete self feels free to show up and participate as they are without fear of judgment.

Jesus said, "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me." (Mt 10:40) Finally, welcoming people means welcoming them as if they are Christ, ready to be transformed by their presence among us.

LAKEVIEW CABIN COMPLETE AT FLBC

Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp has opened the doors to its newest facility — a wheelchair-accessible complex that includes two cabins and a community room overlooking Flathead Lake.

Construction on the 2,030-square-foot Lakeview Cabin Complex began in June 2018 and finished just in time for the Oct. 12 ceremony at the camp, located at 550 Lutheran Camp Road south of Lakeside.

The complex, constructed by Kalispell-based J. Martin Builders, was built in accordance to the federal Americans with Disabilities Act and

encompasses two cabins that sleep eight, bathrooms, shower facilities and a meeting room that accommodates up to 35 people, according to Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp Executive Director Margie Fiedler. A wheelchair-accessible pathway from the complex leads to the dining hall.

The project cost was \$671,000 and was funded through donations and grants, she said.

"The camp has been working for years to make the facility more accessible to those with mobility issues," Fiedler said.

The inspiration behind the project was longtime camper Jason Armstrong of Missoula, who spent 10 summers at the camp and uses a wheelchair.

Armstrong, now a freshman at Missoula College, returned to camp once again as the keynote speaker for the dedication ceremony.

As a youth, Armstrong experienced firsthand the challenges of getting around camp independently and said he needed assistance from his peers and counselors to get up and down the stairs of his cabin, for example.

Fiedler said he also posed the question, "When will more people like me be able to come to this amazing camp?"

"I noticed in my beginning years there that I was the only disabled kid there," Armstrong said, and, although he met a lot of friendly people, "I noticed that I was kind of lonely without people knowing what my experience was and I wanted somebody who knew what I was going through."

Yet the friendships he forged and the joy he experienced kept him coming back and he planted the dream of an accessible camp.

"In my vision, camp was supposed to be for all people, disabilities or not," Armstrong said. "I think I helped open the other side of that bridge."

Seeing the Lakeview
Cabin Complex come to
fruition has meant a lot to
Armstrong.
"It means disabled

campers are going to have a lot more experience knowing who God is and they are going to be amongst kids who really care about them,"

Armstrong said. "For the normal campers who don't have disabilities, it's going

to be new to them, too, because maybe they haven't been around disabled campers before."

He said the Lakeview Cabin Complex exceeded his expectations.

"It was better than I ever imagined it would be," Armstrong said.

His hope is that the work continues to improve wheelchair accessibility at the camp, and to all camps.

"My work is far from done. I want everybody to be able to go to camp, disability or not, big or small, everybody should be able to be there," Armstrong said.
