It seems to take on new meaning this year as we watch for Covid numbers to decrease, wait for vaccines to be approved, and hope for a return to ways of life that we miss. One of the things that has been most disrupted in this time of pandemic is our gathering for public worship, and I am sorry to report that Bethel will continue to experience this disruption. The six local ELCA congregations, in consultation with and the approval of each of their Councils, have determined that the safest course for the foreseeable future is to offer online worship only.

We are right to grieve not getting to see our church family and marking the season with such things as children's programs, choir cantatas, and candlelit services. I'd like to suggest one more Advent resource (click here). Bozeman native John Hermanson is a well-known musician on the national level (he's half of the duo *Storyhill*) and is the church musician at Oak Knoll Lutheran in Minnetonka, MN. For several Advent seasons now, John has offered the hope-filled and poignant music from his recording *Isaiah*. He does this live each night at 7:00 pm for the four weeks of Advent, and I have found it to be a meaningful way to mark the season. At the link above you can

For those of you who would like to make communion bread at home, here is the recipe. Thanks to Darci Barsotti for the idea to share this.

Communion Bread Recipe from Luther Seminary

2 cups whole wheat flour

1 cup white flour

1 1/4 teaspoons baking powder

1 1/4 teaspoons salt

Sift dry ingredients together 3 times (important!)

Stir in 4 teaspoons of oil and set aside.

Mix wet ingredients together until dissolved 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons very hot water (minimum of 180 degrees F)

3 tablespoons honey

3 tablespoons molasses

Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and mix well. Dough should be slightly sticky. Do not knead. Divide into four balls and flatten each into a 1/4 inch thick disk. With a knife, score the top of each loaf into eight pieshaped sections, so that the sections can be more easily broken off while serving. Alternatively, you could score a cross on to the loaf.

Lay the loaves on a baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove from the oven and brush the tops of the loaves with oil. Bake for an additional 5-8 minutes. Let cool.

Yield four 8 ounce loaves.

Bob is doing well and we wanted to share a portion of his email:


I'm generally on the treadmill daily walking 4-5 miles, and I'm looking forward to cross-country skiing when son, Erik, is home for the holidays.

Dear Friend of Family Promise of Great Falls,

We head into the holidays with our hearts heavy as the COVID virus impacts our community – indeed our country – at rates higher than ever before. For we who have placed great value on the opportunity to help those families in our community who have found themselves without a home get back on their feet, this year has been painful. We can only imagine what it must feel like not to have a home into which we can retreat from the incursion of the virus. We can only imagine what it must feel like not to have a home in which we can remotely school our children. We can only imagine the pain felt by those who do not have a home of their own within which they can feel safe.

Having suspended our Family Promise rotational model of providing shelter and comprehensive services for families, we have all struggled to figure out how we can continue to serve those in need. Those who attended our Family Promise stakeholder meeting in September were fairly unanimous in the desire to be able to provide services in some way moving forward. The difficulty has been in determining the best way to do this. Restrictions caused by the coronavirus impact our ability to gather to plan.

In consultation with Donna Lawson from the Family Promise national office, we as a Family Promise Board have determined that we are postponing our planning work until after the first of the year. It seems almost impossible to make decisions in the midst of the chaos and uncertainty brought by the virus, especially as we struggle in managing remote work, remote school, and engaging in day-to-day tasks safely. In early to mid-January we will evaluate where we are.

Our plans are to – in whatever manner is safe, including remotely - convene groups of Family Promise stakeholders to address the following tasks:

- 1. Service Model What services will we provide in what manner to help families with children who are without a home?
- 2. Fundraising What tasks will we take on to fund our work?
- 3. Staffing At what point do we hire staff to help move our plans forward?

Donna Lawson has gathered information for us about the many ways other Family Promise affiliates are continuing to serve families in different formats. It is amazing the ways affiliates have found to safely provide shelter and meals for families! Donna has also prepared a document that describes ways in which we can continue to raise funds to support the work of Family Promise while working under the constraints posed by COVID.

When we re-convene, we are counting on those of you who believe in Family Promise's mission to step up and help with these tasks. Family Promise has never been about a Board running the show. It has always been a community response to family homelessness, involving a partnership of the Board, staff, and members of our faith community. The Board currently consists of only three people; sadly, Kate Triplett had to step down from the Board due to personal circumstances. Also, some current Board members have had changes in work situations that are impacting the amount of time available to serve in their volunteer positions for Family Promise. We are looking for persons who will take on the tasks of chairing the planning committees.

We are counting on Family Promise stakeholders to join one or more of the committees. If we do not have help from our Family Promise community, Family Promise will have to close its doors for good. We know that families in our community need us, so we are believing that that will not happen.

We will send out to this group the information Donna has provided, so you can begin thinking about the tasks you wish to help tackle, the role you wish to play moving forward. We know the need will be there. We know that there is a looming eviction crisis in our country and our community that will impact families even more. We know there will continue to be families in our midst who need our help.

The good news is that we have approximately \$62,000 in the bank. Central Christian is allowing us to continue to occupy the space that has been our office and Day Center. We are poised to begin the work to re-build in early 2021. Please prayerfully consider the role you will play.
