

As the Mission Freedom article reads, they will be hosting a High Tea on May 7th as part of their debt retirement kick off. Some of you are probably wondering what is a High Tea? First, let's explore the origin of tea (the food, not the drink).

The term tea has long been used as an umbrella term for several different meals. Tea as a meal is usually associated with Britain, Ireland and several Commonwealth countries. Tea consumption increased dramatically during the early nineteenth century and it is around this time that Anna, the 7th Duchess of Bedford is said to have complained of "having that sinking feeling" during the late afternoon. At the time it was usual for people to take only two main meals a day, breakfast, and dinner at around 8 o'clock in the evening. The solution for the Duchess was a pot of tea and a light snack, taken privately in her boudoir during the afternoon. Later friends were invited to join her in her rooms at Woburn Abbey and this summer practice proved so popular that the Duchess continued it when she returned to London, sending cards to her friends asking them to join her for "tea and a walking the fields." Other social hostesses quickly picked up on the idea and the practice became respectable enough to move it into the drawing room. Before long all of fashionable society was sipping tea and nibbling sandwiches in the middle of the afternoon.


This was all well and good for the upper classes, but the working classes ran to a different schedule and a different budget. Tea was still quite expensive at the time and the working classes could not afford to waste it on anything other than necessities. A wearied factory worker wouldn't arrive home until six in the evening, and when he did, he was famished! Thus, in the industrial areas of the UK (northern England and southern Scotland), the working classes evening meal evolved: high tea.

High tea is a meal typically eaten between 5 pm and 7 pm. It usually consists of a hot dish, followed by cakes and bread, butter and jam. Occasionally there would be cold cuts of meat, such as ham salad. The term was first used around 1825, and "high" is used in the sense of well-advanced (like high noon, for example) to signify that it was taken later in the day than afternoon tea.

Another possible explanation of why it's called high tea is the fact that it was eaten at a table. In comparison, Afternoon Tea was taken while seating in low, comfortable chairs or sofas. Of course, soon after, the upper classes developed their own variation and also called it 'high tea'. It was a meal that could be eaten when their servants were away or not available, as it was so easy to prepare. The upper class 'high tea' involved the amalgamation of Afternoon Tea and high tea, with the addition of pigeon, veal, salmon and fruit.

It is important to add that the Afternoon Tea menu served in the UK today is often referred to as high tea in many other parts of the world. Because of this some hotels, such as The Ritz in London, use the term 'High tea in London' to advertise their Afternoon Tea because a large proportion of their customers are from overseas.

Some venues do serve a special high tea menu, in addition to Afternoon Tea, which includes additional savory items such as Welsh Rarebit, English muffins, pies or omelette.



Pastor Steve's Message

Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed, alleluia, alleluia!

There is a lot to celebrate this Sunday, each Sunday. It's the Easter season (7 weeks) and people are encountering the risen Christ and confessing their faith in him as their Lord and God. This Sunday is also Flathead Lutheran Camp Sunday at Bethel and we will learn more about our camp on Flathead Lake from our guest preacher, Margie Fiedler, Executive Director of FLBC.

On the evening of the first day of the week the disciples were huddled together in assembly, full of fear of the Judeans. Their ears were listening ever so intently for every step on the stair and for the next knock on their door, lest leaders of the

Sanhedrin might come to seize and arrest them, too. There was something missing. It was joy and peace. For fear had sucked not only joy and peace from them but the very life and breath out them as well. That was until the risen Christ came and stood among them to offer them what they needed -the breath of God which would re-inflate their deflated lives. Then, without their asking, Jesus showed them his wounds. Wounds inflicted by rebellion, rejection and unbelieving hearts. Wounds which would be the source of their salvation..their healing and wholeness.

Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord!

I believe that much of our life is determined by where we happen to be – or where we place ourselves. I'm sure that you have had those moments in life where you just happened to be in the right place and at the right time and met up with someone.... or you were on the receiving end of a gracious gift. It might have been that you placed yourself in a situation or among others where good things where encountered. This past week, I joined a group from the Russell Country Cluster that traveled to Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp to work on a volunteer project, a new pottery shed. To be a part of creating something new! I also happen to believe that we end up with the community, gathered for worship, by the Spirit's calling and leading. Among the gathered, we are in a place where the Word and Sacrament are proclaimed and shared - in our hearing, singing, professing, tasting - there we will experience the risen Christ.

One of the things which caught my attention in the gospel was the powerful witness of the need for being in community. Connected with a community of believers.

Thomas wasn't there when Jesus appeared. Thomas missed the assembly that very first evening of the first day of the week. Who knows where he was? Might he have been less fearful than his friends and he just didn't want to hang out with them? Might he have been resting from exhaustion? We just don't know. Fact is,he was missing from the assembly when the risen Christ appeared to them.

And Thomas, like seekers and wanderers today, wasn't content to simply take the disciples word for it that Jesus was alive. He needed to encounter for himself the living Jesus; he needed to *be there* with Jesus.

It is a week later, and Jesus' disciples were once again gathered in community. And this time, Thomas was with them. And there the risen Christ showed up again, made himself known and spoke to Thomas. And there in community Thomas made his bold confession, "My Lord and my God."

The good news for the disciples huddled in fear; for Thomas who missed the assembly that very first day of the week, and all of us is that the Risen Christ finds us. He finds us in the mystery of the community gathered. He finds us amidst our grief and in the suffering of this world. He finds us in our own fear. He finds us when we wander off and are absent. He finds us in the world, where he is present bringing about new life.

No matter where we are, the crucified and risen One finds us!
