

Pastor's Article: BETHEL GUIDING PRINCIPLE: NEW LIFE THROUGH WORSHIP

I am continuing to help us focus our reflections and worship themes on Bethel's four guiding principles, over the remaining weeks we share before my retirement.

BETHEL GUIDING PRINCIPLE: NEW LIFE THROUGH WORSHIP

Nothing a congregation does compares with the importance and passion of its worship life. Worshiping together with other believers is our most prized moment for giving honest thanks to God. Worship is not a spectator sport. Everyone is welcome to join in the heartfelt praise, stirring music, grace-filled words, Holy Communion, and prayers that call upon the power of God.

The Church Song

The church is not a building where people go to pray; It's not made out of sticks and stones, it's not made out of clay. You can go to worship but you cannot go to church; You can't find a building that's alive no matter how you search. The church is not a business, a committee or a board; it's not a corporation for the business of the Lord. The church, it is the people living out their lives, Called, enlightened, sanctified for the work of Jesus Christ.

This song has been in Bethel's worship song repertoire for many years. As it is sung, it reminds all the members of the Body of Christ, the Church, that whether we are gathered in-person, on-line, we are Church for the sake of the world. What makes us alive is God's Spirit. The Church and it's worship are Spirit born. Spirit inspired. Our dismissal from worship, is our call to love and bless the world.

For all the planning that goes into each worship service by the pastor and the Worship Planning Committee, it sometimes ends up being the small and spontaneous moments that touch the chords of our lives. An "amen!" spoken by a little one in worship. Or a child's singing voice (praise) is heard above all others during the Kyrie or hymns of praise. Along with that, a verse of scripture, a word of prayer, or a story used to bring the preached word may also touch us just exactly in the places where our lives connect. With the permission of Kopper Frick, I share a moment she had with her youngest child, Poppy, during bedtime prayers last Sunday evening. The whole Frick family, extended family and friends were present in worship last Sunday afternoon to celebrate Maelee Frick's public profession of faith. (Kopper) Laying alongside Poppy at bedtime: Poppy said to me, "Mommy, I saw Jesus today with Mae!" (I have learned ovr the years in my role of pastor, that little ones think of me as Jesus...but I'd like to believe that the Jesus she saw with sister, Maelee, was Jesus in the whole community) From the witness of little ones, come the simple yet poignant truths of faith.

Our worship, whether it is in person or online, is about the community of faith in fellowship, in communion with Jesus Christ, praising God and discerning where the Spirit will direct us in our calling to love and bless the world. We have certainly experienced a renewed appreciation for worship, and our connectedness to one another during this time of pandemic.

In the gospel reading from John, we learn of an encounter Iesus had with a Samaritan woman at a well. Each had arrived at the well to quench their thirst. What ensued was a dialogue which dove deep, quickly. She came toting an empty water pitcher that needed filling and discovered that her life, like that empty water pitcher, needed filling, too. Jesus, whom she saw...and met... offered her a living, life quenching, life fulfilling relationship. Out of that relationship, hers/our 'spirit and truth' worship flows. True worship was described as 'worship in spirit and truth." For God, for Jesus true worship isn't bound to a city of the Samaritans or the Jews. It isn't bound within four walls ('sticks and stone'). It is worship which engages our spirit, in the pursuit of truth. Worship which finds expression in serving our neighbor in love.

Friends, in The Church Song, songwriter Jay Beech reminds us all, who are the members of the Body of Christ - the Church- that whether we are gathered inperson, on-line, or in the world, we are connected to Christ. Worship Christ!

When a Pastor Retires

The relationship between pastor and congregation is a special one. A pastor is called to preach, teach and administer the sacraments, but often the connections made go beyond the professional role and become deeply personal. To be sure, it is a gift for a pastor to be involved in the lives of the people they serve. Over time these relationships develop and parishioners become friends. The line between pastor and friend becomes blurred. It becomes difficult, when the time comes and the call has ended, to assume a different role in the lives of these friends.

When a pastor leaves a congregation, members may feel they have lost a trusted friend. Like the eternal presence of God, the presence of God's ministers takes on an aura of permanence, and members are surprised and hurt. It is extremely difficult to shift roles. The pastor ceases to be the pastor and a friend, and becomes friend only; members cease being one's flock and friends, and become friends only. Relationships must be redefined apart from the ecclesiastical roles. The pain of such change only compounds the sense of mutual loss and grief.

Another aspect of this change in relationship and the expectations which



accompany it is whether Pastor Steve and Kaye will retain their membership and continue to gather with the congregation for worship and involvement in Bethel's ministries. The ELCA's guidelines for retired pastors of Word and Sacrament states that "a retired pastor should not remain a member of the congregation served at the time of retirement. This is to prevent divided loyalties in the congregation and pressures on either the former, interim or future pastors. Transferring one's membership to another congregation allows the successor pastor to assume pastoral leadership more readily. It also provides an opportunity for the retired pastor to enter fully into the life of a different congregation with clarity about the pastor's retired role. A retired minister of Word and Sacrament is no longer pastor of a congregation and therefore must discontinue the functions of the pastoral office in any congregation previously served unless specifically authorized to do so. Ministers of Word and Sacrament must respect the integrity of the ministry of congregations which they do not serve as well as the authority of the current pastors of such congregations."

I do intend to abide by these guidelines, and pray that God's grace be sufficient for us all in this time of change and transition. During the remaining weeks as your pastor, I hope that we will be able to find ways to celebrate ministry, share our goodbyes and give thanks to God for the many blessings shared in our life together.

The following paragraphs are from a document of the ELCA on Pastoral Ethics When Leaving a Call and Guidelines for Congregational Membership The following draws heavily upon an Alban Institute publication by Edward A. White—Saying Goodbye: A Time of Growth for Congregations and Pastors—a helpful resource for those wishing to review this topic further.

Bethel Lutheran Church Church Council Reopening Guidelines

We will still be offering a live stream of the service for those who wish to worship from home.

Guidelines:

- Front doors will be propped open and the only entrance into the Church. The west side entrance through the TLC Daycare will remain locked.
- Masks will be <u>required</u> and we have some available.
- A table is at the front doors with hand sanitizer, masks, tissues and an offering plate. Ushers will be there to assist with masks and help people find seats.
- Physical distancing of 6 feet will be observed.
- Windows and doors will be opened to increase air circulation.
- Signs on the restroom doors should be used to indicate if you are in the bathroom in an effort to keep the 6 feet physical distance.
- The kitchen, Fellowship Hall and back office hall doors will be closed.
- Hospitality area will be closed.
- We will pass the peace in a no-contact fashion.
- Sanctuary will be cleaned with disinfect cleaner after each Sunday worship service

Please consider the following <u>before you return to</u> <u>worship:</u>

- Have you traveled outside the U.S. in the past 30 days?
- Have you been in close contact with anyone who has traveled outside the U.S. in the past 30 days?
- Have you been in close contact with anyone with flu-like symptoms in the past 30 days?
- · Have you had any of these symptoms:
 - Fever over 100.4
 - Persistent cough
 - Shortness of breath
 - Sudden loss of taste or smell

If you answered YES to any of these questions, please do not enter and contact your health care provider.


We are looking for individuals who would like to learn how to run the live stream on Sundays.
