## **Lent 2017**

Our theme for the 2017 Lenten Season will be Living Our Baptism...Five Gifts of discipleship. During the five mid-week worship gatherings we will spend time reflecting on the five gifts of discipleship which are rooted in the Baptismal as well as the Affirmation of Baptism liturgies found in the Evangelical Lutheran Worship hymnal. This year we are observing the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation and so it is good, right, and salutary that we would make available to you a devotional book, Free Indeed, which is now available and brings Martin Luther's Small Catechism into your devotional life during Lent. 



# Reflections – March 5<sup>th</sup>

March 5<sup>th</sup>, 1967 – just another Sunday in Dieringhausen, West-Germany...

It was my Confirmation Sunday. Fifty years ago, how time flies. I selected Matthew 16:16 for my confirmation verse, "Simon Peter answered, 'You (Jesus) are the Messiah, the Son of the living God." Why did I choose this verse? I believe that it relates to "living God." We are worshipping a God who is ALIVE and alive in all of us.

For example, we see His compassion for the world in the Family Promise volunteers in Great Falls. We see His compassion when people of all nations show their compassion for the marginalized and suffering world-wide.

Because God is alive in us, our view of God is continuously evolving. As we learn more, we are forced to adjust our understanding of God and the universe God created. For example, during Luther's time, the prevailing world view was that of a "flat earth" and the church leaders of that time militantly supported the flat earth view. Five hundred years later, we are talking about solar systems that have planets able to support life.

This is a giant step from a "single, flat earth" earth to a much

larger understanding.

I re-read Pastor Vetter's confirmation sermon held that day in Dieringhausen. He stated, "We dismiss you today from your congregation's confirmation classes, but you should know that here in Dieringhausen and everywhere were you move to, you'll find a community that is grounded in Jesus' teaching." He continued later by saying, "God will never abandon you and leave you alone when you whole-hearted look for him. You'll always find people who will help you in understanding the apostle's teaching and fellowship." How prophetic these statements were for me!

We see the season of Lent as a time of reflection. In the first chapter of Genesis we hear and read frequently, "And God saw that it was good." God's creation was, and is, good. Our reflection about God's creation may lead us to think about our relationship with nature and our relationship with people of all races and orientations, generally and specifically. We are still struggling with acceptance of immigrants, legal and illegal; specifically, when they are "not as us." We also struggle with the acceptance of the LBGT community. As God will never abandon us, so should we offer our acceptance to immigrants and the LBGT community.


This year is the "Year of Matthew." In discussing my reflections with Pastor Steve, he pointed me to the last chapter in Matthew and "The Great Commission" – "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations ..." (Matthew 28:19). He referred me to the Greek word "ethne." He was helping me to get a better understanding of the apostle's teachings, as Pastor Vetter said in his confirmation sermon 50 years ago.

All nations (Greek "panta ta ethne"), also can be translated as 'all the Gentiles' and expands the mission to include both Jews and Gentiles." I) When Simon Peter made his declaration about Jesus, he was a Jew living in a Jewish community. Later, after Jesus' resurrection, Peter's declaration expanded and included the Gentiles.

Let us worship the living God!

To my confirmation class in Germany, "May you have a blessed Golden Confirmation day!


#### **Day Camp Workshops**
