



Hubba Hubba A Montanan on a Mission Volume II, October 2017

What does peace mean to you? How do you teach English to a room filled with 30 antsy children? What is the difference between a *servees* and a taxi and how much kanaafe is too much? These are a few of the questions I've been asking

myself as I've settled into my new life here.

It rained for the first time in a while last week, marking the traditional beginning of the olive harvest. The rain nourished not only the olive trees but people's spirits too. There are really only two seasons here — rainy and not-rainy—and the language reflects it. The classical Arabic word for winter is shitaa' (شتاء), but because it mostly rains here at-Taqs shitaa' al-yom (the weather is winter today) to mean its raining.

October 1st marked my first full month here in the Holy Land, and with it I have begun to feel more settled. It was difficult to say goodbye to Missoula, which was my home for the the last six years of life. After graduating from college, I satiated my wanderlust by traveling to Morocco and Western Europe. After I returned to Montana, a feeling gnawed at me to return to Missoula, and I moved back in January of 2016. Yet, at the same time, I knew that I would not and could not stay indefinitely in order to keep growing. The last year and a half was both thrilling and droll. I embraced jobs in wilderness therapy and organizing while confronting the challenges of adulthood like figuring out health insurance and plotting a career.

In September, I began volunteering at Dar al-Kalima in Bethlehem, a school operated by the Palestinian Lutherans of the ELCJHL. I see grades 2-10 at least once a week. As a student of language, I find it interesting to watch the process of language acquisition at various ages. With over 30 students in each class, the classes here are big, but the students are enthusiastic to learn. The more time I spend in the classroom, the more respect I gain for the teachers I work with and teachers in general. When I'm able, I also help out with the table tennis activities after school. Working with kids has always been a passion of mine, and this makes Dar al-Kalima feel like home. Some of the kids here struggle to even attend school due to the occupation. Still, the their eyes flicker with curiosity, and this makes me eager to come to school every morning.

LWF Peace Messengers

I recently participated in the inaugural training of the Lutheran World Federation's (LWF) Peace Messengers program (linked at bottom). Along with my fellow YAGM Hannah and a cohort from Colombia, Nigeria, the Netherlands, Finland, Germany, and Palestine, we spent a week learning about peacebuilding in various contexts. We considered what academic literature, faith traditions, and each other had to say about peace; our diverse backgrounds and our immediate setting of Israel/Palestine provided natural fodder for discussion. Seven languages were spoken in our group, which was composed of Muslim, Christian, and non-religious participants. The organizers of the conference brought compelling content for discussion, and in the down time that we created some great memories. One night, each of us shared a dance from our cultures; naturally we danced until past midnight. To me, this illustrates the essence of peacebuilding. It is a dynamic process of give and take, an orientation towards life, and a practice we can all strive for. As Bishop Munib Younan commented, you can't have peace without justice. I would humbly add love to the equation.

I've been blessed with so many amazing experiences already, but I would be remiss to leave out some of the challenges. I studied Arabic before coming here, and I have a decent grasp of the dialect. Still, everyday I have conversations in which I struggle to understand and express myself. Naturally, I am dealing with some familiar habits—unproductive internet use, excessive self-criticism, and a lack of mindfulness. Underneath it all though, I hear a voice telling me to listen—in my conversations, in church, in school, and to the rhythms of life around me. *Hubba hubba* as they say in Arabic. Bit by bit.

I've also read a few books in my time here. I recently finished *Mornings in Jenin* by Susan Abulhawa, a multi-generational novel that evokes the tragedy and *sumood* (steadfastness) of the Palestinian people. History here carries a certain weight that often goes unappreciated in the United States, for Palestinians have had to fight for even the right to tell their own story to the world. On the topic of storytelling and its power, I'm now reading *Jesus* by Marcus Borg. As a historian, I've grown in my faith by learning about the social context of Jesus and the early Christian movement. In many ways Jesus set a model for nonviolence, one that many people, not just Christians, can aspire to. The book is quite incredible. I found one passage quite striking, linked here. The more I learn about Jesus' radical nature, the more I'm encouraged to grow in my faith and the more my faith challenges me. As for figuring out what faith means to me, that is still an ongoing process and practice.

P.S.

There is no such thing as too much <u>kanaafe</u>, Palestinian cheesecake, and a *servees* is like a taxi but its only \$1 instead of \$6. 
