INTRODUCTION



A Note From Pastor Jessie

Grace and Peace to you in this Advent Season,

As we continue to prepare for the coming of Christ during this season of Advent, I am struck by the push I have felt this year to "speed up", "smile", "get it done", and "keep on going". For most of my life I have been someone for whom most of these encouragements fuel my adrenaline and feel good. This year though, I have caught myself feeling the weight of those expectations in a new way. I feel myself pushing back at those imperatives and wondering why we do this so palpably during these

days leading up to Christmas? Why the rush? Why the insistency that we all must feel one sort of way as we long for the coming of a Christ who will make all things new? Why push through everything that is hard instead of slowing down and reflecting on how we might care for ourselves and one another in the midst of it all? While my own experience of this year has shaped these questions deeply, I can't help but see some of the burn out and exhaustion around me as well. I see folks who are tired, folks who are hungry, and folks who are lost in a world filled with problems that seem insurmountable and conflicts that seem unresolvable.

The temptation amid those realities during this season is to put some tinsel on it all, have some eggnog, and act like it's not real until after the New Year. Lucky for us, God refuses to do that. The arrival of Christ is an action that God takes to meet God's people exactly where they are and provide them with a sense of hope and belonging. God doesn't send Christ as a distraction to make us feel good, God sends Christ to us as a resounding reminder that God's love is enough to tend to our tired bodies, broken hearts, and confused minds. God sends Christ as a clear symbol that there is hope that we will always be made whole again on both our best days and worse days. So as we approach this great celebration of the coming of Christ, I invite you to walk into it knowing that this Christ child is so much deeper than just being merry and bright. This Christ child brings to us an eternal hope for a better tomorrow, and an eternal invitation to be a part of the creation of that better tomorrow as well. Praise be to God for that.

Third Sunday of Advent

Patterns of Grace

People who sew often use patterns to guide their creations. To make a skirt, suit, or quilt of a certain size, one cuts out the pattern, pins it to fabric, and then cuts along the pattern to get pieces of cloth that are the right sizes and shapes to be sewn together.

GRACE GRACE

In today's gospel reading we find a pattern that is repeated

throughout the biblical narrative: a person of faith does something that draws the attention of others, which gives them an opportunity to share the story of their faith. The prophets often performed public actions that led to them speaking the word of the Lord. It is not surprising that the conspicuous work of John the Baptist at the Jordan River caused the priests and Levites to wonder if he was "the prophet."

Early in the Gospel of John we are told that John the Baptist was a witness who would testify to the light that is Jesus. John's answer to the religious leaders' queries continues with the language of

testimony, as he confesses that he is not the Messiah. We see the pattern at work here: John's actions are a proclamation all their own, but those actions draw others' attention, and that gives him an opportunity to testify, to share his story of God's way.

This pattern keeps going with us today as God continues to stitch grace into the world. Whose actions of faith have drawn your attention? How have their stories of faith been a comfort or challenge to you? Our actions need not be as ambitious as baptizing a whole community in the river for people to take notice. Our following the way of Jesus will draw people's attention, and their curiosity then gives us an opportunity to testify, to share our stories of transformation, faith, hope, and love.
