INTRODUCTION

John calls people to repent, to clear the decks, to completely reorder their lives so that nothing gets in the way of the Lord's coming. The reading from Isaiah gives the context for this radical call: the assurance of forgiveness that encourages us to repent; the promise that the coming one will be gentle with the little ones. Isaiah calls us all to be heralds with John, to lift up our voices fearlessly and say, "See, your God is coming!" We say it to one another in worship, in order to say it with our lives in a world in need of justice and peace.


THIS SUNDAY AT BETHEL...



On Friday morning, Library staff received information that a Neo-Nazi hate group had placed propaganda in an undisclosed number of Library books. The Great Falls Public Library stands against hate. Library staff removed hate materials from 16 books. Staff examined several sections of the Library, but we cannot be sure that all of the hate materials have been found. If anyone finds this propaganda at the Library or in Library materials, please bring it to the attention of any Library staff as soon as possible. If you find stickers or fliers at

the Library, or anywhere in the community, please note the location and alert the Great Falls Police Department and the City and County Commissions.

This propaganda is being distributed by a statewide Neo-Nazi organization that believes in White Supremacy. They aim to intimidate and threaten non-White individuals, but they also want to radicalize and recruit new members. This literature is dangerous and poses a threat to our community, especially children.

The Library protects intellectual freedom and advocates against censorship. However, we do not allow anyone to use the Library to promote hate or to place unauthorized messages in Library materials. Incidents similar to this have been happening in Great Falls for over a year and a half. In addition to working to remove these materials and protect our individual patrons, the Library believes we must counter this hate speech with more community action.

Recently, the City Commission issued a proclamation condemning these hateful actions and declaring November 12-18th *United Against Hate Week*. The Library wants to work across our community to show that Great Falls rejects hateful ideology. We believe that all are equal and all are welcome here. Our community is filled with beautiful diversity and we see this diversity as a tremendous strength. We want all to feel safe and welcome at the Library and throughout Cascade County.

As a next step, the Great Falls Public Library, the Great Falls YWCA and other community organizations are creating a "Hate Has No Home Here" campaign. We are asking individuals and organizations to promote the "Hate Has No Home Here" graphic. Place the flyer in your home window, display it at your business or school, and share the message on your social media. We need your support. It will take our entire community to stop this hate-filled rhetoric.

We will officially launch the campaign at the City Commission meeting on December 5 at 7 pm. Flyers will be available at the Great Falls Public Library and the Great Falls YWCA. Soon, you will also be able to download them from our websites so you can print your own.

Let's all raise our voices to say "Hate Has No Home Here."

GOSPEL MESSAGE

December 10, 2023 Second Sunday of Advent New Beginnings

There are lots of ways to open a story, perhaps most famously "Once upon a time . . ." Similarly, the gospel-writer Mark starts out, "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ," even though his narrative lacks the birth, angelic announcements, and childhood stories Matthew and Luke tell about Jesus. And John's gospel starts even farther back, at the beginning of creation, before skipping to Jesus' adult years. What we can take from these varying opening narratives is that the story of Jesus does not have one be-

ginning, but many beginnings—each a new entry point into the old, old story of God's love breaking into the world.

Mark starts with an invitation to baptism, repentance, and forgiveness of sins. Even so, John the baptizer declares that another new start is coming, with the baptism of the Holy Spirit that Jesus will bring. What's more, while his baptism by John is clearly not the first event in Jesus' life, it marks a new beginning just before he heads off to the wilderness and then on to start his public ministry.

We celebrate Advent every year at this time, but each time is a new experience, a new beginning of the church year, a new chance to anticipate grace.

What has changed for you since last Advent? What has changed for your family and community? What expectations or hopes do you have for God's presence with us? What new beginning would be a blessing?

Every Sunday is a celebration of the resurrection, and each time we take part in confession and forgiveness we experience a fresh start. Mark opens with baptism, which is a new beginning for each of us. Remembering our baptism offers us daily assurance of the new things God is always unfolding around us. Today as we worship, we pray for the Holy Spirit to stir up something new in, with, and among us.


