Grief Workshop Begins February 19th

Join our guest speaker Rev. Sara MacGilvra Branom, Chaplin at Peace Hospice in Great Falls, as she leads us in discussion about how we, as people of faith, talk about and manage grief.

This will be a three-part education series, you may come to one or all three. February 19th, 26th and March 5th in the Fellowship Hall following worship.

Reverend Sara MacGilvra Branom is an ordained minister of the United Church of Christ. (UCC) Her call is to chaplaincy, she currently serves as the chaplain for Benefis Peace Hospice. She earned her B.A. in Psychology from San Jose State University, a Master's in Human Services from the University of Great Falls, and her M.Div. from Chicago Theological Seminary with a concentration in chaplaincy. Chaplain Sara's basis for her ministry is a response to Jesus' words when the disciples failed to be with him in his greatest time of need the night before his crucifixion. "So could you not watch with me for one hour?" Matt 26:40. Chaplaincy is being with someone in their time of need. To sit with them, share that space invoking the presence of God for com-



fort, and understanding and perhaps find meaning in their lament, and despair by providing spiritual and/or emotional support to all who request it, regardless of their faith, beliefs, or traditions. loving them on their terms as the holy Creation they are.

NeighborWorks Great Falls (NWGF) and Family Promise of Great Falls

(FPGF) have partnered together to provide a family of five facing eviction a place to call home. NWGF provided the renovated home, while Family Promise worked with a family who was struggling to find a place to live after their previous rental home was sold.

NWGF has helped remove or renovate over 500 blighted properties in the community. This home needed extensive foundation repair which required NeighborWorks to do a complete renovation. Once completed, the small 3-bedroom 2-bath home was ideal to create an affordable rental opportunity. Now known affectionately as the "Promise House," the collaboration with Family Promise will create an opportunity for a family struggling to rent a home they can afford. NWGF sees creating more opportunities for single-family residences as a step in the right direction when it comes to addressing some of the housing struggles in Great Falls. NWGF is looking for additional property to be able to create a similar opportunity for another local family.

"We were incredibly excited when NeighborWorks approached us with this opportunity," said Greg Grosenick, Executive Director for Family Promise Great Falls. "It had been a rough summer trying to find housing for our families, but in this case the timing worked out perfectly. This family was literally days away from facing homelessness. We look forward to continuing our partnership with Neighbor-Works and finding affordable housing options for the struggling families of our community."



Born and raised in Great Falls and a proud GFHS Bison graduate, our Board Secretary Beckie Frisbee currently is the secondary curriculum coordinator for the Great Falls Public Schools. Prior to moving to this position, she taught math for 26 years at Great Falls High. In addition to her teaching career, she was an active Campfire volunteer for most of her life and was the Youth Group Leader at First United Methodist Church for many years. When her son's Robotics Team coach resigned, Beckie took over coaching the GFHS team with her husband. She and her family enjoy traveling, seeing

new sights, visiting friends, attending concerts, and especially love anything that Disney has to offer. Her husband, John, is the information technology/network manager for First Interstate Bank. Their son, Marcus, is a software engineer for Schweitzer Engineering Labs (SEL) in Pullman, Washington. They also have two kitties named Smoky and Sox. Beckie bravely stepped up to chair the Soc Hop fundraiser that will be held on April 22. Thank you Beckie for your dedication to Family Promise!

GOSPEL MESSAGE February 12, 2023 SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY A New Community

Anyone who has ever lived or worked with other humans likely knows that community is messy. We hurt each other, sometimes intentionally but often by accident. We say things we regret. We stay silent when we should speak up, or we impose our own beliefs on others when we should start by listening instead. We act rashly out of fear or ignorance or exhaustion. We trample over one another in an attempt to achieve, to win, to earn, or to protect what we assume is rightfully ours.

Jesus knows this side of humanity, and today he invites us to imagine another way. Today's gospel sounds harsh to our ears, but it might actually be an invitation into a community that looks more like the kingdom of God: a community of radical inclusivity, compassion, and care for one another. In this type of community, no one can be simply thrown aside or left behind. Honesty and integrity are the foundation of communication. People are seen in their full, beloved humanity, not as objects to be consumed or cast aside for the sake of others.

In our world today, we might wonder if such a community is possible, but in worship, we get to practice living in a community of faith together every week. Through the reading of scripture, we are reminded of the larger story of God in which we find our meaning: a living story of love, grace, and mercy. We confess our sins before one another and receive forgiveness and a fresh start. We are given our identity as God's beloved through baptism, and we are fed with Christ's own body and united with one another in holy communion. It is Christ at work in us who makes true healing and reconciliation possible, both in our congregations and throughout the world.




Growing strong in faith

1 Corinthians 3:1-9


