THE POWER OF PRAYER



I've been thinking a lot about prayer lately. The power it holds, and the deep meaning communicating with God has in our faith lives. When I was younger I remember struggling with prayer. What should I say? Was it ok to ask for things? How could I possibly say thank you for all of the blessings that I have received throughout life? Who should I even begin to pray for in a world that needs God's love in so many areas? The overwhelm of it all was enough to stop me in my tracks on most days. Then in 2012 something changed that for me. I was in Malaysia serving as a volunteer with the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission program, and I began to receive communication that my name had been put on a circulating prayer list that

would pray for each of the volunteers throughout our year of service. That week folks all around the ELCA were praying for ME and MY placement site. They were thinking of us, caring for our well being, and lifting us up in their own personal time with God. A few months later I got several letters in the mail from a Sunday School class in Southern California. Malaysia was their companion synod (like Bolivia and South Africa are our companion synods), and they were sending letters of encouragement and prayer to all of the ELCA folks deployed in Malaysia at the time. During that time I was on the opposite side of the globe as my family and many of my friends, and those prayers sent to me by complete strangers made me feel a bit less alone and a lot more loved and uplifted. For me, that is a huge piece of what the power of prayer is. It brings us deeper into community, and helps us remember that we are sewn together across the globe to be built up as the body of Christ.

As I think back to those critical moments in my life, I am also reminded that prayer is something that churches are notoriously good at. Our prayer chains, prayer groups, and

ability to share our concerns, hurts, and joys with our Pastors and fellow church members are incredibly important! It reminds us that we are not alone! It brings us together as God's faithful people, and it reminds us that we have a God who is attentive and caring and loving. So dear church, today I wonder, who are you praying for these days? How can we lift one another up and marvel at the incredible power of prayer that comes from that lifting up? I hope and pray that you might ponder those questions in the days ahead. Pray for one another in the good times and the bad, and pray knowing that you speak to a God who loves you and this world more than you could ever imagine.



July 30, 2023, 9th Sunday after Pentecost

The Greatest of Shrubs

Surely God's kingdom should end up sounding more impressive. Surely God can do better. Providing shelter for birds does sound like something God would do, but why can't the birds nest in a more attractive tree? A mustard seed, at its best, grows into a sort of weedy shrub. The greatest of shrubs is not that great.

Maybe that's the point. Maybe these little stories are supposed to seem a little strange. After all, God's choices often seem that way to us. God does not always value what we value. God likes small, weedy shrubs as much as big, majestic trees.



That is extremely good news for those of us who suspect we have more in common with the shrub than the tree. It is good to know that God loves both! It is good to know that God loves the mustard seeds of this world enough that God sends Jesus to be a mustard seed, to be the living proof that the kingdom of heaven is real. And the kingdom of heaven is here, because Jesus is here. And as we are filled with his Spirit, we also become living signs of that same kingdom.

After all, a God whose kingdom can be compared with something like a mustard seed is probably not going to stop short of using other unlikely things. A God like that might even decide to use people like us. So look around. What do you see? What do you see that surprises you? What do you see that you normally take for granted? What do you see that's alive? The kingdom of heaven is like that. The kingdom of heaven is even like us, right now. The kingdom of heaven may not do what we expect, or even what we want—but one way or another, the kingdom of heaven will grow.



Look for hidden treasures of God's kingdom indoors and outside.






Thank you God, for loving me no matter what. I love you, too. Amen


Love letters
