Fourth Sunday in Lent



Family Promise Update for March

Finding a home for one family took a lot of effort and commitment. The family came to us last fall while they were living in a trailer at an RV Park. The parents knew that living in their camper all winter would not be healthy and they wanted to get their children enrolled in school. They came to Family Promise asking for ideas about how to find permanent housing close to schools. How did they end up living in an RV Park? The husband had been badly burned in a work accident and couldn't work. With rents in the Bozeman area rapidly rising they decided that moving to Great Falls where rents were reasonable was their best option. However, once they arrived, they found it difficult to find a place large enough for their five-person family and they also discovered that they had some rental history issues that needed to be addressed before a landlord would accept their rental application. "The staff at Family Promise didn't judge us, they helped us outline a path for going forward", says the mom, who is now working as a manager at a local retail store.

So that Family Promise could help them secure permanent housing, the family paid off their past debt. "We can only help parents who are ready to correct the past and make the lifestyle changes that will give their children a better future", says Maggie Hooker, Family Advocate. Maggie went on to say, "this lovely family has had numerous obstacles and challenges that many of us could not fathom, but they have been steadfast in making good, and at times very difficult, choices for the benefit of their children, including making the decision to send their oldest son to a drug treatment program." The dad is going to Vocational Rehabilitation Training to explore a new career that he can manage given his physical limitations and the other two children are doing well; one's at Head Start and the other is attending Chief Joseph School. They joined a local church which has given them another outlet for support and inspiration. Going forward, Family Promise will stay in touch with the parents to encourage them to keep focused on their goal of providing a bright future for their children.



Volunteer Highlight on Debra McCorriston

Being a person of deep faith through action, Debra McCorriston has been a true godsend to Family Promise.

Debra had volunteered when Family Promise was operating the rotational

sheltering program. "I enjoyed getting to meet the families, spending the night, and making meals", she said, "and when Covid-19 came along and that shelter model was no longer operating I decided to volunteer at the Day Center." Once a week, Debra organizes all the donations and makes sure the Day Center (HUB) is clean and orderly. Also, she and Kathy Remington help the families staying at Promise Place with planning their meals and shuttling them to St. Vincent de Paul Food Bank to pick up their food. Family Promise is just one of Debra's volunteer commitments. She is also a CASA Advocate, she helps at the Eagle Mount barn every Monday, and she works parttime at the Great Falls Public Library. Her journey to Great Falls started when she and a friend were driving through on their way to Glacier Park. When they stopped for gas, Debra looked around and thought to herself, "I could live here", four years later when she retired from the University of Pennsylvania Hospital Transplant Unit after working as a registered nurse for 42 years, she moved to Great Falls. When Debra isn't volunteering, she enjoys completing jigsaw puzzles, reading, hiking, snowshoeing with her ladies' group, and traveling to see her family. Debra, thank you for your continued commitment to Family Promise and to making Great Falls a better place to live!

Next Council meeting April 18th 6:30 pm.



GOSPEL MESSAGE March 19, 2023 Fourth SUNDAY IN LENT

What? Or Why?

What do we believe? Our Lutheran heritage is rooted in theological debate, and such conversations have always been a part of our tradition. Disagreements about theological propositions and biblical interpretations have led to split after split among Lutheran church bodies and congregations. At the same time, our theological and biblical commitments have led us to seek the unity of the church with mergers among Lutheran denominations and with common communion agreements with our ecumenical neighbors. In our broader culture it also seems that theology often leads the way in conversations about faith. Theological principles from various religious communities are used to argue for or against laws, corporate practices, and cultural expectations.

In today's gospel story we find something different leading the way: the blind man's experience of the healing power of Jesus. This experience is at odds with the theological thought of the religious leaders. The narrative reads like a trial, one in which the primary witness is hostile to the line of questioning from the prosecution. The conversations the leaders have with the man and his parents are a mess of misunderstanding that leads to insult and accusation. They are talking about theology; he and his parents are talking about experience. No one is there to translate between the two.

Why do you believe? Our understandings of God are certainly shaped by the communities of which we have been a part and theologies we have learned. Yet, God's grace is not something we logic our way through; it is something we experience. The early church debated all sorts of theological positions, but their witness was grounded in their experience of death and resurrection. What we believe is important, but as we step into each day as witnesses of God's love for the world, why we believe may be the most hope-filled message we have to share.


